Shi Family Tombs in China and Taiwan

Historical and archaeological evidence proves that the relationship

between Sri Lanka and China dates back at least to first century BC.

However, there is not much historical evidence to prove a relationship

between Sri Lanka and Taiwan. The year of 1996 became very important for

Sri Lankan history because of the discovery of Shi family cemetery in

Ouanzhou in South China. The tombs presented 40 names which belonged to

the Shi royal family that was founded by an envoy from Kotte kingdom in

Sri Lanka to the Ming court in China. The tombstone of a founder named Ba

Lai Na and his wife Pu were also included in the collection. Shi clan was

very popular in China because teachers, translators and businessmen

originated from the family. Most of them were social workers. Currently the

twentieth generation is living in China. A member of the fourteenth

generation of the Sri Family immigrated to Taiwan and settled in Changhua

city. Two tombstones found in Taiwan bear resemblance to tombs in

Quanzhou. Three generations (20th, 21st, and 22nd) are living in Taiwan. The

tombs in China and Taiwan add a new chapter to Sri Lankan relations with

China and Taiwan.
